

A CUBAN ROMANCE.

HOW A CALIFORNIAN FELL IN LOVE WITH A FAIR SENORITA.

She Declined to Be Annexed, but Accepted a Protectorate.

(Havana Post, Jan. 2.)

Mr. Alexis Everett Fry, superintendent of schools of Cuba, and Miss Maria Teresa Arreburua, a school teacher, were united in matrimony last night at the government building in Havana.

The wedding was the social event of Cuba for the winter. In every way it eclipsed any social event of the kind which has been given in Cuba for several years.

The teachers of Cuba were determined to make of this a national affair, and the great number present to witness the ceremony last night demonstrated that in this they had succeeded.

General Wood has kindly permitted the use of the large and spacious building for the event, and the railroad had made arrangements for accommodating the crowds who attended.

There were a great many teachers and other school officers present, and Mr. Wood and the great many officers of the army honored the occasion with their presence.

The special trains over the Mariano road were crowded and there were not a few people of Havana who drove to Marianao to be present at the wedding.

Owing to the recent letter of Mr. Fry requesting the Cuban people to remove from their national hymn the expressions of hatred toward Spain, the Spanish Casino of Havana had ordered their hall and the orchestra and that musical organization furnished music for the reception and dance which followed the ceremony.

The ceremony was simple. It was the usual Cuban civil ceremony performed by Senor Silverio, the municipal judge of Marianao.

The fourteen teachers scattered to their homes in all parts of the island and Maria Teresa returned to her home in Caymanes, and little school.

From that time to December three months passed away without Mr. Fry meeting the young lady, but Ojeda was at work through the mails.

It is said that on the 5th of November, the day when the constitutional convention met in Havana, Mr. Fry, always busy and matter-of-fact, sent the following telegram to the young lady in the city of Cardenas:

"I know you are an anti-annexationist but I wish very much to annex a small part of Cuba. May I do so?"

The reply came back: "I cannot be annexed, but will be happy to accept a protectorate."

Mr. and Mrs. Fry will leave today on their wedding tour for New York, Boston, Washington and to the old home of Mr. Fry in California, from which he has been absent for twenty months.

Mr. Fry has secured a leave of absence for three months. He will return to Cuba and take up his work in the schools.

For over a year Mr. Fry has been directing the schools of Cuba and it is entirely due to him that the great progress has been made. It is also due to the manner in which he has conducted his work which has won for him the confidence of the Cuban people, that there is today such a remarkable interest in education throughout the island.

Just before the last war Maria Teresa, then a girl of 17 years of age, was about to go to the city of Baltimore to complete her education.

At the close of the war, when the new school system opened up a means of livelihood to so many women in Cuba, she became one of the teachers in the schools of Cardenas. Her school consisted of the poor colored children of the city.

PERUVIAN EXPLORATIONS.

The first public statement of the University of California's expedition in Peru for the purpose of the investigation of the period of the Incas and General America was made by President Wheeler at the meeting in Philadelphia of the Archaeological Institute of America.

President Wheeler announced that Dr. Max Uhle is now at work for the University in the valley of China, in the interior of Peru.

His first researches were on the 12,000 foot mountain of Marra-Humachuco, from whose rocky summit, towering 2,000 feet above deep, warm well watered valleys which produce the fruits of a tropical climate, are the ruins of ancient fortresses which command an uninterrupted outlook for twenty leagues around.

Thus far in his work in the valley of China, Dr. Uhle has found no traces of any civilization earlier than the present period of the coast valleys.

The painting of the ancient pottery of the Chincha valley, however, is unlike, though not of extreme fineness. It is a type not yet represented in any of the museums of the world.

Dr. Uhle is now working in the interior of the department of Ica, where he believes to have discovered an unbroken link between the Incas and the pre-Inca civilization.
